- 10 My father was a WWI pilot.
- 11 The Battle of the Bismark Sea.

Last month's *mini speaker*, John Roulston, gave us two stories. The first was about Peter van Emmerik, a very popular and capable pilot who lost his life during a mercy flight in an Avro Anson in 1956.

The second was on aerial mustering techniques and developments.

The *speaker of the day* was Ron Minchin who spoke on operations of the Stirling bomber during WWII. Most were amazed at the size of the Stirling and its load carrying capacity.

Together with numerous other types, the Stirling was used to tow gliders to Arnhem with diverse loads, among which were vehicles, guns, stores and soldiers. Some of the soldiers were equipped with fold-up bicycles produced by the BSA company in England.

Staunch member Frank Cocks just happened to have such a bike in his WWII collection, so he brought it along and related a short history of the machine. It certainly added a touch of nostalgia with it parked in the background as Ron spoke.
