



### **Last Meeting**

About ninety members of the Old Fliers Group enjoyed a scintillating talk by Ted Fletcher on the history of aviation in Western Australia. Ted began with the first balloon flight by "Professor" Price in Perth in 1891. He went on to cover the contraption designed by Andrew Barr in 1903, the balloon flights by Sebphe and Eastwood in 1910, the early designs of McMullin and Henderson, also in 1910, and the first flight of a heavierthan-air machine by J.J. Hammond in January 1911. After that followed Alex Fraser's failed attempt in Albany in 1913 and the brief appearance of Andrew Jones in Perth in 1914. He also spoke on the successful Kalgoorlie Aeroplane Syndicate that produced a biplane in 1914-15. Ted's coverage finished at 1919 when Major Norman Brearley returned from WWI with two Avros to introduce commercial aviation to WA.

Ted's was an informative and entertaining talk that drew many questions and discussion from the audience. Feedback from members present indicated that there should be more history discussed at future meetings.

## Mini Speaker

The mini-speaker for September was Harry O'Neil who told us of some little-known facts relating to Bert Hinlker and his fatal crash in 1933. Harry had seen the Hinkler house being demolishes in Southampton, UK, before being transported to Bundaberg where it was rebuilt to incorporate the Hinkler Museum.

In his travels, Harry has visited the reconstructed house/museum and has also visited the Hinkler grave in Florence. He was dismayed at the poor condition of the headstone. The Bundaberg museum has been made aware of the state of the grave and moves are now being made to repair it. Harry has also visited the crash site in the mountains near the village of Cetica about 40 km east of Florence where a permanent plaque marks the spot.

Harry also told of how a small piece of wood from the Hinkler glider of 1912 was carried aboard the ill-fated Challenger shuttle. It was recovered from the Atlantic Ocean and is now on display in the Bundaberg Museum.

Harry's was a most informative talk that acquainted members with little-known facts and interesting personal experiences. Well done Harry.

#### **Hal Sutton**

Nonagenarian, Hal Sutton was so moved by the material that was discussed during the meeting that he came forward and told us of earliest memories and experiences in aviation. He remembered seeing Norman Brearley fly over Mandurah in 1920 or 1921. In 1929 he went for a joyride in the Avro Avian that had competed in the 1929 Centenary Air Race when it visited Mandurah. Hal has also had a long association with aviation and gliding in WA. Thanks go to our two speakers and Hal for their participation in a great day of historical discussion.
