Last Meeting

Again, about ninety members of the Old Fliers Group enjoyed an enjoyable lunch with entertaining speakers.

Mini Speaker

Ian Metcher told us of his early life as a country boy in Brookton. At an early age, Ian played the piano in the local picture theatre for the silent movies. He started work in the depression years and later served with the RAAF during WWII. After the war he qualified as an engineer. Ian was, and still is an outdoor type; over the years he has been involved in motor bikes, yachting, power boating and scuba diving. He took up gliding then powered flight at the age of 75. In his 80th year he took up aerobatics, which he has continued into his 90th year.

He has the distinction to appear in the *Guinness Book of Records* as the oldest competing aerobatic pilot in the world. A few years ago he was awarded the *Get Up and Go* award by the State Government, an award to seniors who *get up and go*!

Ian's wife, Pat, has written a book on his life experiences under the title "Pleased to have Metcher". It is a great read and covers what Ian has packed into his life.

Main Speaker

The speaker of the day was Dick Overheu who spoke of his time in the RAAF during WWII. Also a country boy, he joined up at a very early stage of WWII, moved through his training at an accelerated rate - no square bashing - and quickly through basic flying training and onto Hawker Demons. He soon found himself flying Lockheed Hudsons, and in the thick of the action to the north of Australia. Later, he was one of the first to move onto B24 Liberators where he became an instructor.

As well as mapping his own progress, Dick covered the involvement of various squadrons in which he served and also gave a general picture of the progress in the war and the involvement of the United States in the eventual move on Japan. It was a very informative talk with a number of humerous personal touches.
