February Speaker of the Day

Our *Speaker of the Day* at the last meeting was John "Bomber" Bailey, who spoke on the relatively little-known push by the British to deliver arms and supplies to the Polish partisans, known as the "PK", during the latter stages of World War II. He began by giving the historical background to operation and the need for the flights to start in Italy instead of England.

RAF Group 205 flew Liberators from Foggia in Italy, to Warsaw, and return—a journey of over 2000 miles. The long flights usually started in the afternoon and they returned to their base in Italy the next morning. Between times they spent the night over hostile territory with the prospect of being attacked by day fighters, night fighters, ack ack—and even ground fire as they made their low and slow passes to drop the supplies by parachute at designated areas in and near Warsaw. In a moving talk the audience was quietly stunned to hear of the high attrition rate and the sacrifices that the Group made to achieve their aims.

Thank you "Bomber' for an enlightening delivery that added another chapter to our knowledge of World War II.

February Mini Speaker

Hilly Rostowsky reported on his trip to New Zealand where, among other things, he visited Tom Dick in Christchurch. Tom spends his time as a testing officer for the Civil Aviation Authority of New Zealand. He has wide-ranging interests and a deep love of aviation. During his visit, Hilly sowed the seed for the establishment of a New Zealand Old Fliers Group, similar to ours.
