The *Mini Speaker* was Bob Russell who told us of his mission to parachute supplies to a yacht in distress about eighty miles south-east of Esperance. The yacht while on a voyage from Sydney to Fremantle suffered a rigging failure in the Bight. Later, while servicing the motor, the crew accidentally pumped the oil out of the engine. Bob's mission was to drop replacement oil (and other comforts) to the sailors.

It was interesting to hear how a seemingly simple exercise developed into a number of crises that almost left the aircrew in more trouble than the sailors. It was almost a case of "what could go wrong, did got wrong". However, all survived, and they lived happily ever after.

The *Speaker of the Day* was Brian Floyd who spoke on his association with Avro Ansons. He told us of his dream to fly when, as a lad, he saw a formation of Avro Ansons low-flying along the beach near Perth. Soon after, at the age of fifteen, he started work at Maylands Aerodrome servicing RAAF aircraft, which happened to be Avro Ansons. About a year later, when the war finished, he transferred his apprenticeship with MMA and worked on—you guessed it—Avro Ansons and Cheetah IX engines.

Brian's dream to fly became a reality when he started training with the Royal Aero Club, eventually gaining his commercial licence and flying with MMA, and—you guessed it again, on Avro Ansons.

His dream to fly continued for many more years, flying bigger aircraft for overseas airlines. He retired as a 747 captain.
