Two Mini-speakers

We decided, for a change, that it might be appropriate to have two mini-speakers at our end-of-the-year meeting.

Our first was Brian Walley who told us of how he and his fellow inmates celebrated Christmas in a German prisoner of war camp. He told us of the wide range of skills that his fellow inmates possessed. There were men from all walks of life, mechanics, salesmen, printers, artists, painters, tailors, etc, – but apparently none had any skills in the production of a Christmas pudding – when only makeshift ingredients were available. No matter how they tried, all failed – not once, but year after year.

Our second mini-speaker was Peter Hummerston, He told us of the good work done by the "Honour Avenue Group". This band of volunteers maintains the memorials and hundreds of plaques that line the avenues in Kings Park. Erected to commemorate the efforts of fallen soldiers, the metal plaques and their wooden supports need to be maintained and repaired to keep them in good shape.

It was most disappointing to hear of the amount of vandalism that takes place. It is impossible to understand why vandals would want to drive over, mow down, uproot, deface and even spray-paint such sacred objects. The efforts of the "Honour Avenue Group" are to be admired, particularly when they go back again and again to do their good work.

Speaker of the Day

Our last speaker of the day for 2008 was Caroline Wynton-Rhodes who briefly spoke of her experiences in aviation before moving on to tell us about her grandfather – who flew for the Luftwaffe, both in World War I and World War II. Most were intrigued as the story unfolded. Her grandfather, Theodore Osterkamp, flew Fokkers in the first war and Me109s and FW 190s in the second. He was awarded the Blue Max, Iron Crosses 1st and 2nd Class, Knights Cross and Gold Cross for his efforts. Carolyne displayed the medals during her talk.

Grandpa Theo was a highly respected pilot and administrator but toward the end of the war he fell from favour in the Luftwaffe hierarchy and was forced to resign his commission. So disappointed was Grandpa Theo in the German developments that he eventually took a file and removed the swastika from his pilot's wings. Carolyne had photos of the wings both before and after the removal. Her talk was fascinating – to say the least. Many thanks Carolyne.
