Measuring about twelve centimetres across, the box contained her photograph, a card and a range of gifts – one type for smokers, another for non-smokers, another for nurses, etc. By the end of the war over 2.5 million were delivered to the troops.

Speaker of the Day

The Speaker of the Day was Mike Taylor who told of his experiences in the RAF as a navigator and an instructor on nuclear weapons in the 1950s and 60s – in the days of V-Bombers and the Cold War.

Mike flew in a wide variety of aircraft, some of the memorable ones were the English Electric Canberra, the Vickers Valiant, the Avro Vulcan and the Handley Page Victor – all capable of delivering nuclear bombs.

With the advances in technology, the bombs ranged in size from monsters to midgets. The reduction in size and the increase in explosive power was due to advance in the nuclear materials used in the bombs.
