To his surprise, when he viewed the tape the next morning he discovered that, as well as the cricket, he had recorded the anniversary flight of the Lancaster aircraft that made two passes over the hallowed home of cricket. Reg's son Alwyn extracted the appropriate section of the tape and we were able to view it at the meeting. Prior to the two speakers, we were able to view a wartime newsreel film clip of the construction of Australian Mosquitos in about 1944. Constructed of carbon fibre, it is powered by four turboprops, each with eight curved blades.

The *Speaker of the Day* was Joe Ward who related some of highlights in his forty years in aviation. He started his flying training in USA in 1943. After the usual training he ended up flying a variety of aircraft in the short period before the war ended.

After being demobbed, Joe rejoined the RAF in 1947 and flew Mosquitos on high level photographic work. When they were phased out he graduated to Canberras – mainly on photographic work in England, on the Continent and in North Africa. Next, Joe transferred to helicopters, flying many types before he retired from the RAF. Later he came to Australia where he continued to fly choppers, including the big ones to the oil rigs in the north of our state.

Joe's enthusiastic presentation indicated to all that he was a true professional who really enjoyed his work.

Joe didn't get a chance to say very much about his helicopter experiences, so we can expect him back in a few months time for some interesting anecdotes.
