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Last Meeting

Last meeting started with a series of photos of a Kittyhawk that force landed in the Egyptian desert during WWII. The aircraft was found by a Polish oil exploration team earlier this year.

It was found that the aircraft was piloted by Flt. Sgt. Dennis Copping who went missing on June 28, 1942. It would seem that while ferrying the aircraft from one base to another he became lost and was forced to land in a remote part of the North African desert called Al Wadi al Jadid. After coming to a stop, the pilot evidently exited the aircraft, closed the canopy and disappeared into the sands of history. He apparently survived that landing but not the effects of the desert.

The aircraft remained undiscovered for seven decades – until discovered by the survey team.
