Last Meeting

Once again over eighty members attended the June meeting to hear Tim Jones talk on his experiences in the RAAF flying the F18 Hornet.

Due to a computer problem, the talk by Rob Turner on the 74 spins did not take place. Rob will return this month for another attempt.

Tim Jones

We were delighted that Tim Jones talked about his time in the RAAF flight testing the F18 Hornets that were built in Australia. Although now retired, his memories of those times were sharp.

Previously Tim spoke to us in January 2016 about his time with the Aircraft Research and Development Unit (ARDU) in South Australia.

Tim also gave a short appraisal of the other aircraft types that he flew about that time.

In an interesting aside he mentioned that, on occasions, while the weapons radar was being tested it sometimes locked onto trucks travelling along the Melbourne/Hamilton Highway, some 15,000 feet below. He noted that some trucks that were speeding quickly slowed when the radar locked onto them. Obviously those truckies had a radar detector on board. (Thus the RAAF was doing its bit for road safety!)

Rob went to a lot of trouble to prepare a DVD for his presentation on the 74 turn spin that he carried out in an attempt on the world record.
